


The Ballad of the Unbeatable Hearts

"I'd do anything for you, Smiler", he looked me in the eye... that's when he asked me to help him die.

Smiler is another gripping tour-de-verse that sticks close to Fry's trademark style which will have you laughing out loud one minute and holding back tears the next.

Inspired by Fry's own friendship with a young man in a wheelchair, paralyzed from the neck down after a drunk driving accident, Smiler examines how we perceive disability. Do we treat those with disabilities differently? How would you cope if you became disabled? What if you were responsible for causing permanent harm to somebody? What if your daughter brought home a boyfriend in a wheelchair? Could you fall in love with someone less able yourself?

Smiler deals with drink driving, survival while you're paralyzed, assisted suicide and 1980s German soft-rockers Nena.

Fry's performance is disarmingly honest and committed - Smiler was inspired by the actor's real life friendship with a young man living with a head injury, and the truth of his feeling is palpable.
